The goal of the Yeshiva is to foster within its Talmidim a deeper and fuller life of Avodat Hashem. The Yeshiva emphasizes Talmud Torah as a vital and indispensable instrument for a relationship with Hashem. To truly love Torah, a Talmid must be equipped with the tools and skills to master learning so that he will be properly equipped for a lifetime of limud Torah. Without the skills to learn in a profound and personal manner, it is more difficult to cultivate an authentic love for Torah.

The Yeshiva centers its daily schedule to focus on the study of Gemara. Much of the day is spent learning Beiyun, while opportunities to learn Bekiyut and to explore other areas of Torah exist as well.

An hour Shiur yomi is given during morning and afternoon Seder. Additional hours of Chavruta each day are spent preparing for these Shiurim. All Shiurim are in Hebrew, which could pose an initial problem for Talmidim from abroad. The ramim are more than happy to clarify points at anytime. Evening Seder begins after ma'ariv or supper (depending on the time of year). This Seder is dedicated to studying Bekiyut. Evening Seder in the Yeshiva is divided into two parts: There is time allotted for Bekiyut and a slot designated for Seder Ramim in the personal homes of the Ramim. The overseas program is a fully integrated part of the overall Israeli program. This means that you will learn in a Beit Midrash where the predominant language is Hebrew, and will have Israeli chavrutot. We also designate two English speaking Madrichim to work with and give extra guidance, helping Talmiding acclimatize easier.

Five years ago, the Yeshiva responded to a call by residents of Mevo Dotan in northern Shomron and a branch of the Yeshiva was established there to strengthen the region. Currently, 13 families of kollel students live in the village and assist the residents in coping with the complexities and challenges of life in northern Shomron.

Nearly 1000 graduates of the Yeshiva have taken their places in positions of leadership in all fields of endeavor throughout the country, acting as role models while staying true to the values and direction they absorbed in their years in the Beit Midrash. The Yeshiva's library houses a sophisticated memorial in memory of those students who have passed away or have fallen in the line of duty, as well as those among the Yeshiva's founders and staff who are no longer with us. Their personal stories are intertwined with a vivid description of the Yeshiva's heritage over the years, in order to pass on their values to future generations.

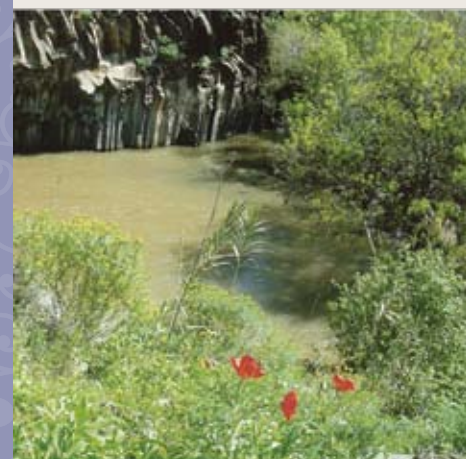
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Who are we?

Yeshivat Hesder HaGolan was founded in Ramat Magshimim in the Golan Heights thirty-six years ago, before moving to its permanent location in the regional center of the Yeshuv Hispin. Its 250 students include 30 married Kollel students. The Yeshiva offers a five-year program that includes a year and a half of active duty in the IDF in combat units. The overseas program is fully integrated into the Israeli program and is a commitment of a year or more.

Many students continue their studies beyond the basic program and participate in a variety of optional educational tracks. Special study programs include a Halacha Kollel that prepares students for rabbinical ordination, in-depth and comprehensive study of the Talmud and teacher's training leading to a B.ed.

The distance from the rest of the country has resulted in the Yeshiva becoming a spiritual beacon of light to the entire region and to all sectors of the population. Recently, collaboration and cooperation has begun with the secular Ohalo College in Katzrin, training their students to become teachers in the national religious school system. This includes a program leading to completion of a B.Ed. at the Yeshiva for men, a program for women at the College, as well as courses for school principals and seminars for teachers in the religious school system.



The Yeshiva's Rabbis and students work together in a variety of educational and voluntary activities throughout the Golan and northern Israel. Talmidim from the Yeshiva operate afternoon Talmud Torah study programs in the area, lead prayers on holidays and the high holy days in non-religious towns and moshavim, teach Bar-Mitzvah lessons,
